



Donated computers power up 12 Prince George charities

Organizations receive needed computer equipment from TELUS through United Way

Prince George, B.C. – Twelve Prince George charities and non-profits are getting new computers from TELUS to help them continue providing important community services. United Way is coordinating the initiative by distributing the information on the opportunity, and in many cases, the computers themselves, to charities throughout the community and northern BC region.

TELUS is helping out during these tough economic times by offering computers to northern B.C. organizations that need updated technology. Twelve Prince George groups expressed interest when TELUS put the word out through United Way in January, including the St. John's Ambulance, the Prince George Council of Seniors, Intersect Youth and Family Services, and the Canadian Red Cross. The 12 Prince George charities are part of a group of 39 organizations across B.C.'s northern region to receive new computer equipment from TELUS.

"Red Cross is very grateful to TELUS for their incredibly generous donation," said Matthew Pretto, Health Equipment Loan Program (HELP) coordinator for the Canadian Red Cross. "These computers are going to enhance the service of Red Cross HELP depots throughout northern B.C. that provide short term loans of much needed medical equipment to those recovering from injury, illness or surgery."

The Red Cross will use the new computers to give volunteers throughout the region access to the electronic HELP database to create loan records and Red Cross email accounts, to increase communication between community depots, and to maintain electronic equipment inventories important in the servicing and maintenance of equipment.

"In the current economic climate, it's critical that everyone reaches out and offers a helping hand, especially to those organizations providing emotional, physical, educational, and financial support in their communities," said Michelle Gaites, director of TELUS Technology Operations in Prince George. "These computers will be used for emergency service support, learning development, educational research, and so much more. I'm so proud of TELUS' efforts to give where we live by supporting local communities."

"We are thrilled to work with Telus on this initiative. Our role is to assist our partnering agencies throughout northern BC in any way we can, and this initiative is one of those instances. We received the call from Telus and got working right away to get these computers distributed to charities that desperately need the upgraded technology. Ideally our partnerships go beyond financial support", said Lesley Anderson, Community Programs and Services Coordinator for United Way.

The computers come equipped with Windows Vista software and everything needed to get up and running right away.
